Mammogram Screenings Tips for patients living with paralysis

- 1. When you call to make your appointment, tell the receptionist that you are a wheelchair user, or explain what type of adaptive equipment you use.
- 2. Disclosing your disability and mobility limitations is helpful.
- 3. Get the name of the individual you are speaking to or the appropriate contact person so that you can reference this conversation.
- 4. Keep notes of the dates, time, and individual that you speak to throughout the following process.
- 5. Explain that due to your disability you need 2 radiology technicians to help position you to get the most accurate mammogram in the most efficient timeframe.
- 6. Explain that you should be scheduled for a one-hour mammogram, even though it might take less time.
- 7. One week before you go to your mammogram, call the facility, and ensure that they are aware of everything you have told them.
- 8. One day before you go to get your mammogram, call the facility and ensure that they are aware of everything you have told them.
- 9. Make sure to schedule your transportation so that you have extra time to find parking and be ready for your appointment.
- 10. If the receptionist does not remember or is unaware of your prior requests, make sure you give the name and date and times of when you called.
- 11. If the facility will not grant you these accommodations, please cite section J of the regulations implementing Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act that were recently issued ensuring that you will get a mammogram with a machine that goes up and down and that you will be accommodated.
- 12. In the event this is not successful, please nicely inform the facility that they will be cited in a complaint that you will file with the Department of Justice and the Office of Civil Rights at the US Department of Health and Human Services.





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
